We are privileged to meet many wonderful people, who, through no fault of their own are diagnosed with an asbestos disease.

Since April 2024 until October 2024 we have received a total of 75 new referrals, ranging from Pleural Plaques through to Mesothelioma. Jenny, Bobby and Orla, our Benefit and Support Advisors are busy contacting and visiting new and existing clients whilst Aileen supports those diagnosed with Pleural Plaques. Thank you to all our staff for the wondeful work they do.

Asbestos Action have become aware of a rising number of people exposed to silica dust which can in turn lead to a condition called Silicosis. Please see Euan Love's article within this newsletter. Asbestos Action plan to support those affected by silica dust.

We again this year, committed funds to sponsor a Mesothelioma Nurse via Meso UK to ensure patients have access to a specialist Mesothelioma nurse, which is vital.

We continue to raise awareness of asbestos related issues as well as campaigning for improvements to current services. We attended the STUC Conference 2024, as well as presenting a Lunch and Learn Event to respiratory personnel in Fife and The Scottish Respiratory Nurse Forum Conference, to name but a few. We currently have a medical student on placement with us, a first for the charity.

As the newletter goes to press Calum Smith is currently running 10 x 10k runs in November in aid of Asbestos Action. His loving father Francis Smith passed away ten years ago this year from an Asbestos related disease. The Smith family have raised thousands of pounds for Asbestos Action over the years in memory of their loved one. We will be there to celebrate with Calum when he finishes his final 10k. Addressing Emerging Risks: Supporting Those Affected by Asbestos and Silica

Working alongside Asbestos Action, I have seen how vital their support is for individuals impacted by asbestos-related diseases, providing not only compassionate care but also a powerful advocacy platform. As a solicitor, I'm proud to work with this charity to help secure justice and compensation for those affected. For decades, asbestos disease litigation has been a critical area of Digby Brown's practice, allowing us to hone the skills and resources needed to tackle complex occupational health cases.

As we look to the future, a new occupational threat has emerged: silica-related lung disease. Silica is a naturally occurring mineral and exposure is common in construction, mining, and manufacturing industries. It poses serious risks that could mirror the asbestos crisis.

Recent reports by the Westminster All-Party Parliamentary Group (APPG) on Respiratory Health have spotlighted the unknown scale of the silica problem in the UK. These reports stress the need for action, with calls for enhanced workplace safety measures, better disease tracking, and increased awareness around silica exposure.

At Digby Brown, our team is uniquely positioned to pursue silica-related claims, given the parallels with asbestos litigation. The legal strategies and precedents we've developed in asbestos cases will be invaluable in helping workers affected by silica exposure seek compensation. We understand the intricacies of these cases from identifying liable parties to navigating complex medical evidence—making us wellequipped to advocate for clients dealing with silica-related conditions.

Asbestos Action can use their existing links with medical professionals to address this emerging health crisis, offering resources, emotional support, and guidance on accessing benefits—many of which parallel those available for asbestos disease sufferers. With their experience, the charity is well-prepared to lead public awareness efforts for this overlooked risk.

With Asbestos Action expanding into silica-related support and our expertise in asbestos litigation, we will work hard to support these emerging victims. Together, we are focused on securing the rights and protections workers need to combat the growing impact of occupational lung disease.

Did you know?



DID YOU KNOW: The Wizard of Oz crew used chrysotile, which is a white asbestos for the snow scene, they showered Judy Garland with it. In fact, in order to create winter scenes in many old Hollywood movies, film makers used pure white asbestos fibres to replicate the look of snow. Don't get me started on white Christmas, scary stuff!

DID YOU KNOW: that Amosite asbestos also has the appearance of fluffy white snow and was sold as a Christmas decoration from the 1930s right up into the 1950s. DID YOU KNOW: There is a city in Russia named after its biggest export, the city is named Asbest. In 2023 Russia mined 630'000 tons of asbestos and the material still pours onto the world market. Incidentally Asbestos has been banned in more than 60 countries, but not in the U.S.

DID YOU KNOW: The UK is one of the countries in the world where the incidence of asbestos related diseases like mesothelioma, is the most prolific. The first recorded UK case was in 1924 in Rochdale, where 33-year-old Nellie Kershaw died of pulmonary asbestosis.

DID YOU KNOW: There were over 3000 products in the UK that contained asbestos, far too many to list here. Some of the products range from aprons, tablecloths, cisterns, floor and roof tiles, mattresses, pipes, rugs, tape, twine, carpets, partitions and cigarette filters, the list is endless. The UK imported a staggering five million tonnes of asbestos before the total ban in 1999.

DID YOU KNOW: A brand of cigarettes in the 1950s, Kent cigarettes, used extremely toxic Crocidolite asbestos in their filters and somewhat perversely,

these asbestos filters were advertised as a health and safety feature in the 1950s.

One of our members, John Millikin (81) was diagnosed with an Asbestos related disease in 2023. John's story is a familiar one to Asbestos Action. He was a skilled shopfitter in the Glasgow shipyards and although John had other jobs after the shipyards, this is where he learnt his trade as a carpenter. John gave us an insight into his approach to life and what motivates him.

John explains that woodturning has a rhythmic quality which is incredibly calming and therapeutic. The repetitive motion and focus required helps to quiet the mind, reducing stress and anxiety. He says that he loses himself in the process, he enters a state of mindfulness, fully focussed in the moment. John describes himself as thinking of nothing else other than the lumber and woodworking tools in his hands. The art of making things out of wood requires a lot of patience.

John continues to enjoy and still uses his wood turning lathes in his garden shed (workshop). He makes an array of items, such as bowls, pens, clocks, ashtrays, quaich, and we must say how impressed we are with the excellent quality of his work.

It's great to see John making these lovely pieces and carrying on with the hobby which he loves.

There are real people behind asbestos diseases and we thank John for sharing his passion.

you need to do is fill the empty cells and each column, row and region must contain the numbers 1 – 9 exactly once.






